Edison lost his job when an experiment caused a fire on a train and he started a new job as a telegraph operator. The telegraph was an electric machine for sending messages and Edison became interested in electricity. He started to invent things, usually with electricity, and in 1869 he sold his first invention for \$40,000.

In the 1870s, he made lots of important inventions that changed the world, including a type of record player and a movie camera. He also invented the light bulb and brought electricity to many cities in the United States.

When Edison died in 1931, many people turned off their lights in memory of him. He invented more than 1,000 things and some of them helped to create the world we live in today.
